3.1	Key Issues At its meeting in August 2021, Belfast City Council's City Growth and Regeneration Committee agreed to write to the Minister for Communities and the Minister for Infrastructure, in relation to public realm projects within the city centre specifically in relation to ensuring that the outworking's of the Bolder Vision are adequately captured and addressed within public realm					

- 3.2 scheme designs, and that a number of capital schemes are progressing through design without an holistic overview of a modern transport plan. The Committee asked that the Ministers consider the impacts of the current BRT2 preferred route options would impact the public realm and open spaces of the city centre, but also noted that effective public transportation connections would need to be delivered and asked both Ministers to address these issues as a priority and to bring forward capital investment at pace.
- 3.3 Accordingly, Democratic Services wrote to the Minister for Communities (Appendix 1) and Infrastructure (Appendix 2). A response was received on behalf of the Minister for Communities, from the Acting Director, Belfast Regeneration (Appendix 3) and on behalf of the Minister for Infrastructure, from the Private secretary to the Minister (Appendix 4). The response highlights on behalf of the Minister for Communities, outlines awareness of the challenges that the current BRT2 preferred options poses to the public realm and the city centre environment and further outlines an upcoming joint Dfl/DfC/BCC meeting on the 12th January, with both Ministers for Dfl and DfC due to attend, to discuss these issues and to agree a way forward.
- 3.4 The response on behalf of the Minister for Infrastructure outlines that the Belfast Metropolitan Transport Plan (BMTP) will be developed in a collaborative manner with the five relevant councils, and that early engagement between the Department's officials and council representatives has taken place. The response further advises that the city centre will be the initial focus for the BMTP and early in the New Year, along with supporting consultants, the intention is to commence the detailed work of considering changes to walk, cycle, public transport and road networks to meet the shared objectives of the Department and the council. The Department have advised that they will contact Democratic Services to organise a meeting/workshop which hopefully can be held in January 2022. The response further outlines the development of plans for the delivery of phase 2 of the Belfast Rapid Transit (BRT) Project and the option that was recently consulted on, which recommends two-way operation of Glider along Donegall Place and Royal Avenue. The Department advise that if the aspiration of significant modal shift to sustainable transport is to be achieved, public transport must be made more attractive than car, and that pushing public transport to the fringes of the city centre would be counter to this. The response also highlights that considering public transport in advance of the BMTP could result in a relatively narrow view that does not integrate sustainable transport modes nor provide the solutions necessary to meet the future needs of a cleaner, more attractive and more accessible city. The Department also advise that Translink is engaging on The Bolder Vision, Streets Ahead and BRT projects and encourage Council to continue to engage proactively to ensure the best outcomes for public transport and the city.

3.5 Members should also note that under the Bolder Vision officials and officers from Dfl, DfC and BCC are under taking extensive consultation across all sectors of the community and city stakeholders to provide an holistic approach to how we can effectively deliver quality space within the city centre while maintaining effective public transportation connections and reducing the severance to communities and the wider Belfast area. PUBLIC REALM PROJECT BELFAST

Thank you for your letter of 11 November 2021 in relation to public realm projects in Belfast city centre. Minister Hargey has asked that I respond on her behalf.

As part of the Belfast Streets Ahead (BSA) programme the Department plans to deliver two major public realm projects over the next number of years. The BSA Phase 3 will see public realm improvements delivered in the north of the city and BSA Phase 5 will deliver public realm improvements in the south of the city centre. Together these projects will cover a significant part of the Civic Spine (from the Ulster University to Queens University) as set out in "A Bolder Vision for Belfast".

The Department has ambitious plans to deliver high quality streetscapes and public spaces for those who live, work and visit the city centre as well as creating an enhanced environment for those communities living on the periphery of the project areas. In order to deliver these schemes effectively consideration must also be given to the Department for Infrastructure's plans for the area and the future operation of the transport system before BSA Phase 3 and BSA Phase 5 plans can be finalised.

Minister Hargey has noted that the Belfast Rapid Transit Phase 2 (BRT2) proposals, (which were recently consulted on) and realises that these could potentially pose challenges for the strategic commitment as set out in the Bolder Vision, "for a greener, cleaner and more liveable city centre". The potential BRT2 route along Royal Avenue/Donegall Place and along Dublin Road impacts will impact upon both the BSA

Phase 3 and Phase 5 projects and may be regarded by some to reverse improvements achieved in Donegall Place which were introduced in BSA Phase 1 of the programme.

As a result, Minister Hargey has asked officials to set up a workshop with the Minister for Infrastructure, her senior officials and Belfast City Council to discuss these issues and agree a way forward. This workshop has been arranged for 12 January 2022.

Subject to the outcome of this workshop it is the Department's intention to move forward with finalising the designs for both BSA Phase 3 and BSA Phase 5 as quickly as possible so that we can commence the construction stage of these projects. It should, however, be noted that, due to the exceptionally high levels of funding required to deliver these schemes and taking account of Departmental budget constraints it is planned that the construction stage of BSA Phase 3 will have to be completed before the construction of BSA Phase 5 can commence on the ground.

I trust this addresses your concerns but if you require any further information please let me know.

PUBLIC REALM PROJECTS

Thank you for your email dated 11 November 2021 in which you have requested an update on the above.

The Belfast Metropolitan Transport Plan (BMTP) will be developed in a collaborative manner with the five relevant councils. Early engagement between the Department's officials and council representatives has taken place and they soon intend to reconvene the Project Board previously used to develop the Belfast Metropolitan Transport Study (BMTS).

The city centre will be the initial focus for the BMTP and early in the New Year, along with supporting consultants, the intention is to commence the detailed work of considering changes to walk, cycle, public transport and road networks to meet the shared objectives of the Department and the council.

The BMTS, which the council inputted to, reviewed the existing transport conditions. The Minister is happy for your committee to meet and work with the Departmental

BMTP team at the start of the process. Departmental officials will contact you to organise this meeting/ workshop which hopefully can be held in January 2022.

The Department is currently developing plans for the delivery of phase 2 of the Belfast Rapid Transit (BRT) Project. The option for BRT2, which the Department has recently consulted on, recommends two-way operation of Glider along Donegall Place and Royal Avenue.

Penetration of the city's main retail and commercial thoroughfare by public transport is vitally important for the economic vitality of the city and to enable accessibility for those who are less mobile. Such an approach would be consistent with most vibrant cities.

If the aspiration of significant modal shift to sustainable transport is to be achieved, public transport must be made more attractive than car. Pushing public transport to the fringes of the city centre would be counter to this.

Establishing clear and effective priority for public transport services into and across the city needs to be at the forefront of future planning, however, transport for the city needs to be considered holistically, if it is to be successful in meeting the desired outcomes. Consequently, considering public transport in advance of the BMTP could result in a relatively narrow view that does not integrate sustainable transport modes nor provide the solutions necessary to meet the future needs of a cleaner, more attractive and more accessible city.

In addition to delivering significant enhancements in the city through development of the Belfast Transport Hub and Yorkgate Station, Translink is engaging on The Bolder Vision, Streets Ahead and BRT projects, with the aim of finding the optimum layout for roads and public realm, balancing place-making aspirations and transport needs.

Given the work outlined, I would encourage the council to continue to engage proactively to ensure the best outcomes for public transport and the city.
