



3.0	Main Report
	Details of the Premises
3.1	St. Malachy's Old Boys' Association has held a Seven-Day Annual Indoor Entertainment Licence since 1998.
3.2	The current days and hours during which entertainment can be provided are:
	 Monday to Saturday: 11.30 a.m. to 11.00 p.m. and Sunday: 12.30 p.m. to 11.00 p.m.
3.3	Under the provisions of the Licensing and Registration of Clubs (Amendment Act) (Northern Ireland) 2021, in addition to the normal hours shown above, the club may apply for up to 104 extensions a year to sell alcohol until 01.00 am on any day of the week. These are authorised at the discretion of the Police Service of Northern Ireland (PSNI) and, if granted, these also enable entertainment to be provided to the end of the drinking up period on those nights. The drinking up period extends to 2.00am on those nights that an extension licence has been approved by the PSNI.
3.4	The areas currently Licensed to provide indoor entertainment and their occupancies are the:
	Ground Floor lounge bar with a maximum capacity of 45 people
	Ground Floor Main Function Hall with a maximum capacity of 200 people
	Ground Floor Darts room with a maximum capacity of 38 people
	First Floor Recreation room with a maximum capacity of 50 people.
3.5	The Function Hall is used on an ad hoc basis for family parties and charity functions which usually involve a late licence to 1:00am with music provided by a DJ operating via their noise limiting device.
3.6	The Club has advised that it has not had entertainment scheduled since before Covid-19.

Licensing History

- An application for an Entertainments Licence for this premises was first received in 1997, and, whilst objections were received for the initial grant and first renewal, the licence was renewed under delegated authority, with no objections having been received, for the years 2000 2008.
- In March 2009, an objection to the renewal of the licence was received by the Service. This objection was resolved through a resident meeting with the Club and with special conditions being added to the licence following a special meeting of the Licensing Committee on 29 April 2009. The licence subsequently has been renewed under delegated authority with no objections received on each subsequent year until the present.
- 3.9 At the Licensing Committee meeting in April 2009, the Club agreed to the following special conditions being attached to its licence:
 - 1. Bottle bins to be moved to a location away from the wall adjacent to residential property;
 - 2. Fire doors at the rear of the function room to be used only in emergency situations and not to be used at any other time;
 - 3. The smoking area to be restricted to that part of the alleyway immediately adjacent to the premises;
 - 4. Patrons to be discouraged from using the rear yard immediately adjacent to residential property; and
 - 5. Regular meetings to be established between the club committee and officers from the Service in order to deal with any problems which might arise in respect of the licence.

Representations

Objector's Representation

- 3.10 One written representation was received as a result of the public notices of application from a local resident. This was received within the 28-day statutory period.
- 3.11 The letter of objection is attached at Appendix 2.
- The objector submitted video clips on two memory sticks to support their objection. The video clips were dated from 2nd July, 2021 to 27th May, 2022. The issues arising from these videos relate to:
 - Patron conversations in the rear garden
 - Beer bottle delivery and collections causing noise
 - Damage to wall at objector's property alleged to be from beer bottle collections
 - Patrons at rear garden of premises calling objector's name as she videos.
- 3.13 The Building Control Service sent a letter offering to facilitate a meeting between the objector and applicant, but this offer was not accepted. The Service also offered to meet with the objector independently, but this too has not been accepted.
- 3.14 The objector's Representation Form is attached at Appendix 3 and it has been provided to the applicant, as required by the protocol.

- 3.15 In general, the representation relates to concerns as follows:
 - noise nuisance and abusive behaviour from patrons gathering at the rear of the premises;
 - nuisance caused by beer deliveries and collections; and
 - failure to comply with conditions attached to the entertainment licence.
- 3.16 The objector has been invited to attend the Committee meeting to discuss any matters relating to the objections, should they arise.

Applicant's Representation

- 3.17 The applicant has provided their Representation Form, as required by the Protocol, and a copy of their response, along with letters of support, is attached at Appendix 4.
- 3.18 The applicant's Representation Form has also been provided to the objector, as required by the protocol.
- 3.19 A summary of the applicant's representation is as follows:
 - They have not been made aware of any complaints about the club and, had they
 been aware of any problems, they would have investigated these with a view to
 taking any reasonable steps to address them;
 - They have had no complaints raised with them by either the PSNI or the Council's noise team;
 - They are open to discussion on any steps they can take to address the objector's concerns; and
 - Other residents in the area are supportive of the club and have no complaints.
- 3.20 The applicant and/or their representatives will be available at your meeting to answer any queries you may have in relation to the application.

3.21 No counter representations have been received at the time of writing this report. A copy of the report has been provided to the applicant and objector and a verbal update will be provided at the meeting in respect of any further representations which are received.





- 2.2 For either option, this would be on the proviso that such applications did not relate to premises where the provision of entertainment had been subject to significant objections or prosecution in the past.
- 2.3 In such instances, these applications would be presented to the Committee for consideration.

3.0 Background

- 3.1 The Committee, at its meeting on 19th January, considered a report on the Licensing and Registration of Clubs (Amendment) Act (Northern Ireland) 2021 and agreed:
 - i. to delegate authority to Council officers, on a three-month trial basis, to deal with any Article 44A extension applications for non-City centre locations in a similar way to that which had been agreed for Biddy Duffy's and Horatio Todd's at the meeting on 15th December, 2021, with the proviso that such applications did not relate to premises where the provision of entertainment had been subject to significant objections or prosecution in the past. In such instances those applications will be presented to the Committee for consideration:
 - ii. that a report on the outcome of the aforementioned trial period be presented to the Committee for consideration; and
 - iii. that the report on pubs and hotels in City centre locations, the operation of Biddy Duffy's and Horatio Todd's and on Police Service of Northern Ireland Authorisations for Additional Hours, which was due to be presented to the meeting in February, be submitted at the same time as that relating to non-City centre premises.
- 3.2 At the Committee meeting on 13th April, the trial period was extended for an additional 6 months in the manner previously agreed by Committee.

Summary Position following the April Committee Meeting

Biddy Duffy's, 133 Andersonstown Road Horatio Todd's, 406 – 408 Upper Newtownards Road

- 3.3 The Committee agreed to offer no objection to Article 44A extension applications for Biddy Duffy's and Horatio Todd's up to 19th October 2022 and that each applicant be requested:
 - i. to agree to withdraw all Article 44A extension applications beyond 19th October, to allow officers to provide at the Committee meeting in October an update on any issues which had arisen from the operation of the premises during the 9-month trial period, given that both premises were located in close proximity to residential accommodation; and
 - ii. to agree not to provide entertainment after 2.00 a.m., unless an Entertainments Licence was in place which expressly permitted entertainment to take place beyond that time.

Pubs and Hotels - Non-City Centre Locations Generally

The Committee agreed that, should any further Article 44A extension applications for non-City centre locations be received between the April meeting and 19th October 2022, officers should deal with them in a similar way as those for Biddy Duffy's and Horatio Todd's, in that each applicant would be requested:

4.1	To date, Biddy Duffy's has only once availed of the additional hours of operation permitted by their Article 44A applications whilst Horatio Todd's has not used any of their additional hours applications.		
4.2	The licensee of Biddy Duffy's has advised that they are not using their additional hours because customers are no longer interested in late nights, post covid, whilst the licensee for Horatio Todd's will not be applying for any further additional hours claiming that they cost too much in legal fees and provide no return.		
4.3	Given that the premises are close to residential properties, the intention of the extended trial period was to consider whether the premises operating to the later hours, or any period immediately following their termination, led to undue inconvenience to persons residing in the vicinity.		
4.4	Despite a prolonged trial period of over 9 months, there is still no evidence to provide for Committee in relation to the impact, if any, of these bars selling alcohol to 2.00 am on their local neighbourhood.

4.5	Since the Committee meetings in January and April, no other Article 44A extension applications for non-City centre locations have been received by the Council.

4.10 The applicant must display notice of the application on or near their premises during the three weeks before the first occasion to which the application relates. The Council must also be served with a copy of the Notice three weeks before the first date to which the application relates.  - i. to agree to withdraw all Article 44A extension applications beyond 31st January, to allow officers to provide at the Committee meeting in February an update on any issues which had arisen from the operation of the premises during the month of January, given that both premises were located in close proximity to residential accommodation; and
 - ii. to agree not to provide entertainment after 2.00 a.m., unless an Entertainments Licence was in place which expressly permitted entertainment to take place beyond that time.

Pubs and Hotels – Non-City Centre Locations Generally

- 3.5 The Committee agreed that, should any further Article 44A extension applications for non-City centre locations be received between this meeting and 31st January 2022, officers should deal with them in a similar way as those for Biddy Duffy's and Horatio Todd's, as long as they did not relate to premises where the provision of entertainment had been subject to significant objections or prosecution in the past.
- 3.6 In such instances, the application would be presented to the Committee for consideration.

Police Service of Northern Ireland Authorisations for Additional Hours

- 3.7 The Committee agreed that authority be delegated to Council officers to deal with Police Service of Northern Ireland authorisations for additional hours and that no representations be made unless there is reason to do so by virtue of any:
 - a. restrictions placed upon the Entertainment Licence (if the premises associated with the application has an Entertainments licence),
 - b. complaints regarding the operation of, or anti-social behaviour in and around, the premises, and

- c. Building Regulation or other Council statutory enforcement issues.
- 3.8 The minute from the meeting of 15th December has been circulated.

4.0 Key issues

- 4.1 Members will be aware that new Coronavirus restrictions came into force on 26th December 2021 which, amongst other measures, required nightclubs to close and prohibited dancing in all other licensed premises.
- 4.2 Should these restrictions be lifted prior to the Committee meeting on 16th February, there is a possibility that a number of pubs and hotels in non-City centre locations may wish to apply for an Article 44A order for additional permitted hours to serve alcohol until 2.00 am for St. Valentine's night and/or the weekend nights leading up to it.
- 4.3 As your decision in relation to any Article 44A extension applications for non-City centre locations only covers the period to 31st January 2022, that would preclude officers from making any delegated decision in relation to applications associated with St. Valentine's night or any other application for dates from 1st February to 16th February.
- 4.4 Given the additional impact on the hospitality sector that the latest restrictions have created and the fact that any venues that have applied for extension licences will have had limited opportunity to utilise them to date, the Committee may wish to consider reviewing how any extension applications for dates prior to your meeting on 16th February, and in particular St. Valentine's night, are dealt with.

- increases the number of occasions smaller pubs (which are not structurally adapted and therefore unable to apply for an Article 44 licence) can apply for late opening (11.00pm 1.00am) from 20 to 104 times per year, and
- increases the number of occasions registered clubs can apply for late opening (11.00pm -1.00am) from 85 to 104 times per year.

The applicant must display notice of the application on or near their premises during the three weeks before the first occasion to which the application relates. The Council must also be served with a copy of the Notice three weeks before the first date to which the application relates.

The Council has not received notification of any applications in relation to the Police Service of Northern Ireland authorisation for additional hours since your meeting last December.

There is therefore no evidence to provide for Committee in relation to the impact, if any, of any applications to the Police

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for authorisation for additional hours on local neighbourhoods.

Conclusions

Coronavirus has had a significant impact on the licensed trade and it would seem that the introduction of new legislation to permit longer opening hours has not had the widespread uptake that might have been expected.

As trade in the industry and tourism generally begins to pick up again it is anticipated that there will be greater interest from pubs and hotels in availing of the opportunity to serve alcohol until 2.00am.

To date the introduction of the new legislation does not appear to have had any impact on the rights of local residents not to be subject to unacceptable disturbance. This situation will be kept under review as the licensed trade recovers from the impact of the pandemic.

The Committee agreed to extend the trial period for a further six months and delegated authority to the Director of Planning and Building Control to deal with all such applications in the manner which had been previously agreed.
