1.2	Members are advised that when considering applications, the Council may refuse an Entertainments Licence because the applicant has been convicted of an offence under the Order within the period of five years immediately preceding the date when the application was made.					

1.3 As a result of a previous conviction, the applicant is now required to appear before Committee and convince Members as to why their application for an Entertainments Licence should not be refused. 2.0 Recommendations 2.1 Taking into account the information presented and any representations received you are required to consider the application in light of the recent legal proceedings and determine if you wish to refuse the Entertainments Licence on the grounds that the applicant has been convicted of an offence under the Order. 2.2 Should Members be satisfied that the application need not be refused you are then required 1. approve the application for the grant of the Seven-day Annual Entertainments Licence, or 2. approve the application for the grant of the Seven-day Annual Entertainments Licence with special conditions. 2.3 If the application is refused, then the applicant may appeal the Council's decision within 21 days of notification of that decision to the Recorders Court. The applicant may also appeal any special conditions attached to the Entertainments Licence. 3.0 Main Report Key Issues 3.1 The matter is before Committee because the applicant and Secretary of the club, Mr. Alexander Cromie and the Club Treasurer, Mr. Tommy Whiteside were convicted of offences under the Order at Belfast Magistrates Court on 14th March 2017, having been found to be holding indoor entertainment on the premises on 23rd July 2016 without an Entertainments Licence being in place. 3.2 As a result, the applicant was convicted and an Absolute Discharge was imposed on both defendants and they were ordered to pay court costs of £138. 3.3 Members are advised that the Club previously held an Indoor Entertainments Licence, which expired on 31 March 2013. Despite several attempts by officers to get the club to make application they confirmed that they did not wish to renew the Entertainments Licence. **Premises** 3.4 Currently the premises operate as a registered members club with ground and first floor bar areas. The applicant has applied to provide entertainment in both locations, as was previously licensed, with a combined occupancy of 410 people, as follows: Ground Floor Bar – 110 persons First Floor Bar – 300 persons 3.5 Officers are working with senior club officials and their representatives to agree the occupancy of these respective areas and do not expect that they will differ greatly from those previously granted.

- 3.6 A copy of the application form is attached at Appendix 1.
- 3.7 As the premises is a registered club, the days and hours during which entertainment can be provided are:
  - Monday to Saturday: 11.30 pm to 11.00 pm
  - Sunday: 12.30 pm to 10.00 pm.
- However, a registered club can apply to the local Police Service Sub-Divisional Commander for authorisation to extend the hours during which alcohol may be sold on up to 85 occasions in any period of 12 months. On those occasions the above hours may be extended:
  - from Monday to Saturday (except Good Friday or Christmas Day), from 11:00 pm to 1:00 am on the following day;
  - on Sunday (except Christmas Day or Easter Day), not being 31 December, from 10:00 pm to 12 midnight; or
  - on Sunday, being 31 December, from 10:00 pm to 1:00 am on the following day.
- 3.9 Where such authorisations are obtained, entertainment may be provided to the latest hour to which alcohol may be sold.
- 3.10 The long-term plan for the club is to move into a new development within the confines of the existing site.
- 3.11 A location map is attached at Appendix 2.

### Representations

Public notice of the application has been placed and no written representations have been lodged as a result of the advertisement.

### **PSNI**

3.13 The PSNI has been consulted and has confirmed that it has no objections to the application. A copy of its correspondence is attached at Appendix 3.

### Health, Safety and Welfare Inspections

3.14 Following the offence, Officers of the Service met with the management of the Club to discuss the use of the club and the short and long term plans for the club. The meetings also allowed Officers to explain the procedures for the grant of an Entertainments Licence and included advice on fire safety procedures and measures that should be in place for safe evacuation from the club should an emergency situation occur.

### **NIFRS**

3.15 The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service has been consulted in relation to the application and has confirmed that it has no objection.

### Noise Issues

3.16 The Environmental Protection Unit has been consulted in relation to the application and they have confirmed that no complaints have ever been received relating to noise break out from the premises or due to patron dispersal.

	<u>Applicant</u>
3.17	The applicant has been made aware of the concerns raised by the Committee regarding the level of fines imposed by the Court and the new procedure which you have adopted to give Members the opportunity to seek assurances as to why their application for an Entertainments Licence should not be refused.
3.18	As a result, they have been invited to attend your meeting to answer any queries you may have in relation to the future management of the premises.



### 3.0 Main Report

### **Key Issues**

- 3.1 Members are reminded that the normal process for dealing with Entertainments Licence applications which are not the subject of objections is that the licence will be granted as provided for in the Council's Scheme of Delegation.
- 3.2 However, as each applicant has been found guilty of committing an offence within five years of the application for a licence being submitted to the Council, you are required to consider the following applications.

3.3 Notwithstanding the possibility of refusing an Entertainments Licence on any other grounds, the Council may refuse an application on the grounds that the applicant has been convicted of an offence under the Order.

### Application History

### **Teach Na Monagh**

- This is the fifth time that an application for the premises has been considered since the applicant was convicted on 29th January 2013. The last renewal application was brought before the Committee at your meeting on 17th August 2016 and, after consideration, you agreed to renew the licence.
- 3.5 Since the previous renewal, the premises have been subject to three during performance inspections as well as the renewal inspection to ensure that there has been no recurrence of these or any other safety issues. As a result, we have found that management procedures are being implemented effectively.

	The Spaniard
3.6	This is the second time that an application for the premises has been considered since the applicant was convicted on 11th August 2015. The last renewal application was brought before the Committee at your meeting on 20th January 2016 and, after consideration, you agreed to renew the licence.
3.7	Since the previous renewal, the premises have been subject to two during performance inspections as well as the renewal inspection to ensure that there has been no further safety issues. As a result, we have found that management procedures are being implemented effectively.

3.9	Notice of the applications has been advertised and no written representations have been received.
	<u>PSNI</u>
3.10	The PSNI has confirmed that it has no objections to the applications.
	<u>NIFRS</u>
3.11	The Northern Ireland Fire Rescue Service has been consulted in relation to each of the applications and has confirmed that it has no objections.

3.0	Main Report
	Key Issues
3.1	Custom House Square is the responsibility of the Department for Communities and it currently holds both a Seven-Day Annual Outdoor Entertainments Licence and a Seven-Day Annual Marquee Entertainments Licence for the Square.
3.2	The standard days and hours during which the marquee is currently licensed to provide entertainment are:
	Monday to Sunday: 11.30 am to 11.00 pm.
3.3	In addition, the following conditions are attached to the Entertainments Licence:
	<ol> <li>maximum numbers will be agreed at the discretion of the Building Control Service and will vary depending upon individual concert set up proposals;</li> <li>prior to any event taking place the promoters are required to demonstrate evidence of early consultation and have in place a robust system of dealing with any complaints, which has been agreed in advance with the Council;</li> <li>any requests to provide entertainment later than 23:00hrs must be considered by the Licensing Committee and therefore must be made at least 3 months in advance of the proposed event; and</li> <li>should the Council receive a significant number of noise complaints for any event which has successive nights of entertainment permitted beyond 23:00hrs or if a complaint about an event beyond 23:00hrs is of major concern, then those successive nights with later hours may be subject to reduction and the promoter should have appropriate arrangements in place should this occur.</li> </ol>
3.4	This is the ninth year of the festival, which is now established as one of the main blues festivals in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.
3.5	It is a standard condition of the Marquee Entertainments Licence that all requests to operate beyond the permitted hours of entertainment must be considered by the Licensing Committee.
3.6	Members will recall that, last year, the Committee granted an extension beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm for the Belfast City Blues Festival at Writers Square. On that occasion, the event operated from Friday 24th to Sunday 26th June and the organisers requested that entertainment be permitted beyond 11.00 pm to 12.00 am on each of those three nights of the event and, after consideration, you agreed to grant the request to extend the hours.
3.7	Members will also be aware that the Committee has previously granted extensions beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm for other events and festivals at the venue, most recently for the Cathedral Quarter Arts Festival and the Belfast Beer Festival.
3.8	Whilst recognising that such music events contribute to the overall 'vibrancy' of the City, it is also the case that noise from these events has the potential to cause widespread disturbance to those living and working in the vicinity.
3.9	Before granting any extension, the Committee has always carefully considered the financial and commercial benefits of such events against the interests of residents within the area and has, on occasions, agreed with respective promoters to reduce the number of nights they had originally intended to go beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm in order to reduce the impact the event may have upon them.

### **Rationale for Additional Hours**

- 3.10 The organisers are still in the process of finalising the programme of entertainments for this year's festival but they have confirmed that the purpose of the festival is to celebrate the musical heritage of the City and that, through the event, they will promote this message with over 45 live performances by local and international blues artists taking place. The event will also consist of screenings of archive film of local musical greats and music workshops.
- They aim to deliver a great festival experience and one of the main reasons they wish to run the live performances at the marquee to 12.00am is to allow patrons a greater opportunity to attend the event whilst also availing of the great local restaurants and other establishments within Belfast before and after the festival.
- As this is not an application to vary the terms of the Marquee Entertainments Licence but a request for Council's permission to extend the hours under an existing licence condition, there is no requirement to advertise the application.
- Officers are currently working with the organisers to develop their event documentation, namely the Event Management Plan and layout plan for the site, and to agree a suitable occupancy and other provisions in order to manage the event safely.
- 3.14 Officers will also ensure the organiser produces a suitable resident's notification letter and ensure that it is distributed to the correct addresses prior to the event taking place.
- 3.15 Representatives of the Belfast City Blues Festival will be available at your meeting should you wish to seek further information about the festival.
- 3.16 A copy of the letter from the organisers outlining the background to the festival and reasons for requesting the extended hours to 12.00 am is attached at Appendix 1.
- 3.17 A location map is attached at Appendix 2.

### **PSNI**

The PSNI has been consulted regarding the festival and their request to operate all three nights of the event to 12.00 am. It has confirmed that it has no objections to this proposal. A copy of their correspondence is attached at Appendix 3.

### **NIFRS**

- 3.19 The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service has also been consulted about the application and has confirmed that it has no concerns about the event and has requested to be kept involved with the planning for the event.
- 3.20 Members are advised that, as with all such events, planning meetings will be held in due course, and attended by officers of the PSNI and NIFRS to look at public safety, traffic management, transport and any wider operational issues.

#### Health, safety and welfare issues

3.21 Officers from the Service have carried out inspections for previous Belfast City Blues Festivals and have found the organisers to be professional in their approach and have had no issues with the health, safety and welfare management of the event during that time.


3.22	A pre-event planning meeting has already been held with the organisers, the Department for Communities and the PSNI and they are co-operating fully to ensure that everything is being done to protect public safety and to reduce the potential for noise disturbance and general nuisance from the event.			
	Noise Issues			
3.23	The Environmental Protection Unit has been consulted in relation to the request for late night entertainment to run beyond 11.00 pm to 12.00 am on each of the three nights at the venue.			
3.24	Due to the cumulative impact of the consecutive nights proposed and potential sleep disturbance to nearby residents, officers are concerned that there is a greater potential for complaints after 11.00 pm. Members are reminded that the Clean Neighbourhood and Environment Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 gives councils additional powers in relation to entertainment noise after 11.00 pm.			
3.25	However, considerable work has been done with organisers of various events and festivals at the venue and as a result, the level of complaints and noise issues has been reduced. Last year's festival, which took place at Writers Square did not generate any complaints.			
3.26	Nevertheless, officers are currently working with the organisers and their representatives on a noise management plan and procedure for the festival. As per all events at the venue, the noise management plan must demonstrate that noise from the event will not cause unreasonable disturbance to both the commercial and residential premises of the area.			
3.27	Officers will consider all reports and supporting information to ensure the technical requirements are in accordance with all the relevant legislation and guidance.

3.28	Officers will be required to carry out inspections at the event but this is catered for within existing Service budgets.

3.29	There are no equality or good relations issues associated with this report.



1.3	The variation applications for both premises were received on 22nd November, 2016 and the outdoor grant application for the Wellington Park Hotel was received on 3rd May, 2016.			
1.4	The outdoor grant application was delayed pending the outcome of an application made to the Planning Service to vary one of the conditions of the planning permission, which had been originally granted on 19th May 2016, which prevented amplified music from being played within the outdoor area.

- 2.3 A copy of an email explaining why the objection from the Lower Malone Residents Association is outside the 28 day period and explaining why Members should take it into account is attached at Appendix 1.
- A factor which Members may also wish to take into consideration is the previous history of objection, Committee hearings and court cases associated with these premises and the fact that the Entertainments Licences for both premises currently have conditions which require the licensee to attend liaison meetings between Belfast City Council, the Lower Malone Residents Association and the PSNI.
- 2.5 If you decide not to take the late representation into account then the indoor applications will be dealt with under the Scheme of Delegation and the outdoor application will be brought before you at a future meeting for your consideration.
- However, should you exercise your discretion, you are required to set a suitable date and time to receive the persons who made the representation, the applicant, and/or their representatives and, after having received their submissions, make a recommendation regarding the applications.

### 3.0 Main Report

### **Key Issues**

- Written representation objecting to the applications has been received from the Lower Malone Residents' Association. This was received outside the 28 day statutory period in the form of an email.
- 3.2 The nature of the objection relates to the following:
  - the ability of the premises to operate to 3.00 am would have very serious detrimental effects on residential amenity in and beyond the immediate vicinity of the premises;
  - Wellington Park is designated as a 'residential area' for planning purposes, and an
    increasing number of properties in the area close by are occupied by residents. The
    extension of an Entertainments Licence until 3.00 am will result in a prolongation of
    the noise and other concomitant nuisances produced by late night revelry until well
    beyond that time:
  - noise would be bad enough at weekends, but to have the disturbance going on for most of the night during the working week will make life intolerable for residents, who have to get up to go to work in the morning or to take their children to school;
  - in the long term it would also make it difficult to resist similar extensions in other
    establishments nearby. It is one thing to have a night-time economy, but this
    proposes what is effectively an all-night economy in a residential area; and
  - the density of residential occupation is increasing, and the area is wholly inappropriate for this type of Entertainments Licence.

- 3.4 Members are advised that we are currently mediating with all parties to try and resolve the issues.



#### 3.0 Main Report

#### **Key Issues**

- 3.1 Members will recall that, at your meeting in January, you considered the outcome of the public consultation on the proposed fees for Street Trading Licences and agreed to defer the report to enable officers to provide additional information, to examine options for introducing the proposed fees on a phased basis over the term of a licence and for establishing a fee for a one day licence.
- **3.2** A copy of the minute from your January meeting is attached at Appendix 1.
- Below is a summary of the proposed fees which you provisionally agreed at your meeting on 15th June, 2016.

#### Implementation of Revised Fees

- Members may wish to note that, when they set revised fees our existing Stationary and Mobile, licensees will only pay the new licence fee at the commencement of their next trading year.
- For example, a trader who was granted a 3 year licence in December 2016, will not pay any reviewed annual licence fee until December 2017. Additionally they will not pay the revised renewal fee until December 2019.

#### Fee Options

A number of fee charge options are outlined below for consideration following your previous meeting. To assist the Committee, an overview of all of the options below is attached at Appendix 2.

#### **OPTION 1**

- 3.7 By far the largest single expense identified in dealing with the Street Trading Licensing scheme arises from the tasks associated with the application for the grant of a new licence.
- 3.8 We have critically re-visited the amount of time spent on each task and have identified some areas where processes could be streamlined with enhanced use of IT systems in an effort to reduce costs.
- 3.9 We have also examined the current frequency of licence compliance checks for permanent traders to determine if we can reduce that element of the costs.
- Currently, Stationary and Mobile traders are inspected 4 times a year. It is proposed to reduce the number of inspections to 1 compliance visit per year. Should Members agree to this option, the effectiveness of this reduced level of compliance checks will be monitored closely.
- A detailed review of the reports brought before Committee for consideration was undertaken. Approximately 50% of Stationary and Mobile licence applications and 33% of Temporary Licence applications are considered at Committee.
- 3.12 By recovering the respective percentage cost for the applications that are considered by Committee and spreading it across all of the respective licences we are further able to reduce each application cost.
- In 2002, when the first fees were calculated, it was envisaged that Designation would not happen yearly. Members will be well aware that Designation has subsequently become an annual consideration as there have been regular requests from both the Council and from members of the public for new areas to be designated.
- **3.14** For this option, it is proposed that Designation will not take place yearly, but every other year, thus the Designation cost can be halved and spread across two years.
- 3.15 This saving will not change the cost of a Temporary Licence as the Designation costs are not applied to this type of licence.
- **3.16** By undertaking these proposals the following revised fees have been calculated:

3.17 What these new fees will mean for an existing mobile trader who trades Monday to Sunday is shown below. Over the 3 years the cost of having a licence will increase by £829 or on average £276 per year which equates to £5.30 per week.

3.18 The cost of a Temporary licence for the 12<sup>th</sup> July or Saint Patrick's day is currently £165. Under this option it will be now be £530, an increase of £365.

#### **OPTION 2**

- 3.19 Another option to consider would be to apply the cost of inflation to the current fees set in 2002 to determine the 2017 fees.
- 3.20 Adopting this option will give Committee, in any future fee review exercise, a better baseline for comparison as these fees will be more relevant to present day monetary value.
- 3.21 However, this option will not address the significant shortfall in cost recovery for the licensing application process.
- This option would also require the use of the current charging structure and not the proposed new fee structure consulted on in June 2016 which had included, for example, a reduced fee for the renewal of a licence and the harmonisation of mobile and stationary licence fees.
- However, by using the original fee structure this would address Members concerns regarding the increased cost of a Temporary Licence for one day.
- 3.24 The cost of inflation increase was determined using the Bank of England's inflation calculator.

3.29 The cost of a Temporary licence for 12<sup>th</sup> July or Saint Patrick's day is currently £165. Under this option it will be now be £807, an increase of £642.

#### Additional Request from the Committee

#### Trading one Day a Week - Monday to Friday

- 3.30 Committee, at your meeting in January 2017, asked Officers to consider the fee for a permanent trader who has a Monday Friday licence but only trades on one day during the week.
- 3.31 It must be stated that the costs associated with processing the grant or renewal of the licence is the same whether it is used for one day or every day of the week. However, based on the original proposed fees of £1,500 (Mon-Fri) Members may wish to consider using a fifth of that cost and decide that a fee of £300 is set specifically for one day's trade. This fee can be set dependant on what Options above Committee agree on.

#### Financial and Resource Implications

- 3.32 There are significant financial and resource implication associated with this report.
- 3.33 The proposed Licence fees at option 3 are most likely to ensure the cost of the operational and administration processes are proportionate to the licensing scheme; particularly in relation to the costs for processing a grant or renewal of licence application.

#### **Equality or Good Relations Implications**

The Council's Equality and Diversity Officer has been consulted and there are no issues with regards to the setting of fees.
