No interests were declared. 4.0 **Minutes of Previous Meeting** 4.1 Councillor Barra O'Muiri noted that the action to share the Social Value slides from the previous meeting had been completed and asked if the Panel agreed that the minutes of the previous meeting were an accurate reflection of the meeting. Councillor Pete Byrne proposed that the minutes from the last meeting were agreed. Seconded by Councillor Robert Burgess Members agreed the minutes. 5.0 **BRCD Programme Report** 5.1 Damien Martin (DM) presented the programme report, emphasising the progress made since the previous meeting in moving the deal into the delivery phase, despite the governance complexities and the challenging financial and economic environment. Key points of update included: Contracts for Funding (CfFs) have now been approved and signed for Carrickfergus Regeneration, Bangor Waterfront, and Newry City Centre Regeneration. The Advanced Manufacturing Innovation Centre (AMIC) contract has been signed by DfE and QUB and is with BCC for final signing. The draft contracts for the Institute for Research Excellence in Advanced Clinical Healthcare (iREACH), the Global Innovation Institute and Mourne Mountain Gateway are being actively progressed. A City & Growth Deals Senior Stocktake meeting was held in October 2022, hosted by DoF to discuss progress to date across all Northern Ireland City and Growth Deals and key issues and challenges being experienced, such as the impact of construction inflation and concerns about the complexity of arrangements and pace of delivery. Following the Stocktake a number of key areas of change/action have been identified and engagement with senior officials in the key government departments is ongoing to seek to agree a plan of action, to underpin a more collaborative model of working, to help ensure a focus on delivery and avoid the introduction of additional complexity.

Councillor Uel Mackin noted the number of projects in the Programme Update which are awaiting DoF approval and queried the role of DoF and if there was an issue within DoF which needed to be addressed.

DM noted that DoF have not prolonged the OBC approval process to date and generally DoF approval is granted with 2-3 months, provided no significant issues are identified. Engagement continues with DoF to keep this timescale as short as possible and in line with these timescales the DoF approval for Destination Royal Hillsborough would be expected in the near future.

Councillor Uel Mackin also requested clarification on whether the CfF was a standard template, or if each Council would have to negotiate this separately and raised concerns about the CfF timescales and potential impact on costs.

DM confirmed that the CfF is a standard template, but also has a number of project specific conditions included within the Annexes which need to be agreed with the Department and Partners. CfFs need to be agreed through Partners normal approval processes before signing. DM acknowledged that this has been a long process, but once the CfF is signed, funding will start to flow to projects.

Councillor Alistair Cathcart welcomed the signing of the CfF for the Bangor Waterfront project. Cllr Cathcart expressed concern about construction inflation and the impact on costs, which could potentially lead to a reduction in benefits and queried whether this might result in withdrawal of support for projects?

DM advised that he did not believe this would happen as inflation has been built into costs at OBC stage, with some projects increasing their Partner contributions to address these inflationary pressures. Whilst there will no additional Government funding to address inflationary pressures, Government Partners recognise that there is exceptional inflationary pressure and that ultimately money will buy less benefits as a result of this. DM also noted that there are options to reduce scope without having a significant impact on benefits and that other solutions are being explored including the potential to leverage additional funding.

6.0 BRCD – Delivering transformative investment in Newry, Mourne & Down

6.1 Marie Ward, Chief Executive, Newry, Mourne and Down District Council delivered a presentation on the impact of the BRCD programme on Newry, Mourne and Down, the Belfast Region and Northern Ireland. The presentation highlighted:

- The new way of working and the collaboration across local and central government, universities and colleges and crucially engagement with private sector which will be key to delivery of jobs and economic growth, which is critical to recovery following the pandemic and economic crisis.
- The importance of the Employability and Skills pillar in delivery of inclusive economic growth and ensuring we have the right people with the right skills to deliver on these objectives.
- The three projects Newry Regeneration, Mourne Mountain Gateway and Newry Southern Relief Road, to be delivered within Newry, Mourne and Down and the benefits these projects will deliver.
- The exciting investments within the digital and innovation pillars, that will grow and enhance the
 opportunities that exist across the region and will help to maintain our talent and young people within
 NI.

Cllr Bara O'Muiri highlighted the importance of the employability and skills and digital projects, which he believes will make a significant difference to the region.

7.0 BRCD Website
