Subject:	Climate Change Conference

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Relevant Background Information

In 2009 The European Unit recognised the need to develop a series of <u>key</u>_-seminars reflecting key issues <u>in Europe that</u> affect<u>ing European</u> cities. <u>CUnder this action</u>, elimate change was deemed to be one of the most important issues both in terms of the environment and economics affecting cities across Europe.

From an EU Member State perspective, the 2006 Stern Review concluded that the scientific evidence for climate change is now overwhelming and that climate change should be regarded as a serious global threat demanding urgent global action. Lord Stern's views have been echoed by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) whose Fourth Assessment Report concluded that global atmospheric concentrations of carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide have increased markedly as a result of human activities and now far exceed pre-industrial values.

Recognising the Stern Review's call for prompt action, <u>Belfast City</u> the Council's 2008-2011 Corporate Plan has identified reducing the <u>C</u>eity's impact on climate change as a key priority within the strategic theme of 'Better care for Belfast's environment - a clean, green city now and for the future'. <u>Moreover</u>, the <u>Council has as a key performance</u> indicator <u>also</u> <u>adopted the tonnage tonnes</u> <u>of carbon dioxide (CO₂) emitted from its</u> premises as a key performance indicator.

In terms of indicative actions supporting this key priority, the Council committed to the adoption of a European Declaration on Climate Change for the <u>Ceity</u> and to the subsequent development <u>of</u> a prioritised action plan to address the causes and consequences of climate change within Belfast in collaboration with outside bodies and local communities.

<u>The</u> Council formally subscribed to the Eurocities' Declaration on Climate Change (<u>-see Appendix 1</u>) at the Eurocities' Annual General Meeting in Stockholm on 28th November. 2009.

On <u>22nd January 2010</u>, the Strategic <u>and</u> Policy <u>and</u> Resources <u>a cC</u>ommittee endorsed <u>the a</u> proposal to establish an inter_agency group <u>working group</u> on <u>Cc</u>limate-<u>C</u> change <u>for the Ceity</u>. This group will <u>seek to</u> address <u>key</u> climate change issues currently affecting <u>the cityBelfast</u>, <u>thus-via the</u> develop<u>ingment of</u> a Climate Change Action Plan for the city.

In order to develop an effective prioritised Climate Change Action Plan for the city it would have to demonstrate civic leadership by developing actions to minimise greenhouse gas emissions associated with its own activities. Council would also have to identify how its Departments could contribute individually towards the Action Plan through their everyday business activities. Departmental awareness raising regarding the Eurocities Declaration on Climate Change has already commenced via the recent Thematic workshops and associated briefing materials. The Council should also consider how its services and functions can be adapted to account for the predicted future impacts of climate change within Northern Ireland.

The Council's anticipated role in the development of a Climate Change Action Plan would-will be to act initially as a convening body and to <u>then</u> function <u>then</u> as a coordinating and managing organisation for <u>theits</u> implementation and monitoring. Accordingly, it is considered that a climate change educational event could serve as a suitable formal launch for the wWorking gGroup and help to prioritise its work programme.

Key Issues

<u>IWith this in mind, it</u> is proposed that the Council <u>agree to hostorganise</u> a Climate Change Conference <u>in Belfastfor the city</u>. Th<u>e conference would is would be to</u> address political objectives agreed by the Council around the climate change agenda and <u>to</u> inform on the key objectives of the Eurocities Declaration on Climate Change. It is proposed that the conference <u>will</u> take place <u>in Aautumn in the autumn_2010</u>, probably September. The <u>programmeagenda</u> is yet to be <u>finalised</u> due to the necessity <u>toof the</u> involvement of the inter_agency <u>working</u> group on Climate Change. There will however be a European element to the programme as well as central and local government involvement.

It is <u>anticipated</u> that approximately 100 delegates will attend the conference.

Resource Implications

Financial implicationsFinance:

The conference will cost approximately £10,000. This is included in the European Unit's 2009-2010 budget.

Human Rresources:

The European Officer for Health and Environmental Services – Sarah Jayne Smith and the Sustainable Development Manager – Alastair Curran, will organise the conference.

Recommendations

It is recommended that Members agree to host The Committee is asked to agree the City Conference on Climate Change at a cost of approximately £10,000.

Decision Tracking

Following approval and subsequent ratification, the planning for the proposed conference will proceed.
