3.3 Notwithstanding the possibility of refusing an Entertainments Licence on any other grounds, the Council may refuse an application on the grounds that the applicant has been convicted of an offence under the Order.

## **Application History**

Previous applications for the aforementioned premises were considered by the Committee as follows:

## **Wolf and Whistle**

The applicant was convicted of offences under the Order at Belfast Magistrates Court on 28th June this year, after a during performance inspection found a series of breaches, namely, one leaf of a final exit had been closed and screwed to door frame; Log Book for pre-event checks was not completed; fire door wedged open; fire door/wall providing inadequate fire protection; fire safety signage not being illuminated; and a designated means of escape was obstructed.

	This is the first time that the premises has been convicted for offences, as previous Entertainments Licences have been granted under the Council's Scheme of Delegation.					
	Red Devil Bar					
3.6	This application is before the Committee as EMC Properties (NI) Limited was convicted of an offence on 11th February 2014, after a during performance inspection found a locked roller shutter on a final exit and that the log book for recording pre-entertainment safety checks was unavailable for inspection. As a result, EMC Properties (NI) Limited was fined £500 and ordered to pay legal costs of £69 for the offence.					
3.7	Members may recall that previous renewal applications were brought before the Licensing Committee on 17th September 2014 and 21st October 2015 and, after consideration, you agreed to grant the licences.

3.8	Notice of the applications has been advertised and no written representations have been received.					
	<u>PSNI</u>					
3.9	The PSNI has confirmed that it has no objections to the applications.					
	Health, Safety and Welfare Inspections					
3.10	Following the offences, officers of the Service met with the licensees of each of the premises to review their management procedures and ensure that appropriate measures are in place to prevent a recurrence of the previous problems. Officers also discussed the arrangements in place for the safety of the public, performers and staff at all times and, in particular, if an emergency situation should occur.					
3.11	Each of the premises have also been subject to further inspections by officers of the Service in conjunction with their application inspection and on each occasion we found that management procedures are being implemented effectively.					
3.12	Copies of the application forms for each of the premises are attached.

3.13	The Northern Ireland Fire Rescue Service has been consulted in relation to each of the applications and has confirmed that it has no objections.
