1.0	Purpose of Report	or Summary of main Issues		
1.1	Members will be a	ware that Belfast City Council is engage	d in a partnership with the	
	Department for Cor	mmunities (DfC) and the Northern Ireland F	Housing Executive (NIHE) in	
	the delivery of the A	ffordable Warmth Scheme. The scheme ain	ns to address fuel poverty for	
	the most vulnerable	households in the city.		
1.2	This report provides	s an update on the scheme and details the i	mpact of the reduction in the	
	monthly referral targ	get and associated funding for Councils.		

2.0	Recommendations
2.1	The Committee is asked to
	Note the contents of the report and consider writing to the Department regarding the
	current funding arrangements for the scheme and seeking clarification on future
	funding.
3.0	Main report
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	Key Issues
3.1	During 2016-2017 the Service completed 534 referrals to the NIHE. The total value of
	approvals granted for the scheme was £2,096,984.34. In total 1372 measures were installed
	and 646 homes improved within Belfast.
3.2	A large number of vulnerable households are currently in fuel poverty in Belfast and the
	scheme continues to receive a high volume of enquiries. The scheme is primarily targeted,
	however there are 600 vulnerable households currently on the self-referral holding list. The
	team continue to triage the cases to ensure that the most vulnerable are helped.
3.3	Correspondence issued from DfC to Councils on 29 th March 2017, contained in Appendix 1,
	states that the number of referrals which will be accepted by the NIHE has reduced from 46
	per month to 25 for each council area. The reduction in referrals will have a large impact on
	the number of vulnerable households being able to avail of the scheme.
3.4	The funding to Council to deliver their part of the scheme has also been reduced from an
	average of £26,812 per quarter in 2016-2017 to £13,575 for the first quarter in 2017-2018.
	While the exceptional difficulties presented in the current political crisis are recognised, the
	ongoing uncertainty on funding for the remainder of the year leaves councils in a position
	where they are having to review staffing levels.
3.5	In an attempt to ensure continuity of service for the scheme, the service has been working
	with our financial team and have agreed to retain staff during Q1 to allow time for clarification
	to be provided from DfC. However, failure to get any formal confirmation could result in
	resources having to be reviewed.
	Reducing the resources to this program of work will make it more difficult to refer citizens to

3.6	other agencies and to provide important added value activities such as referrals for home
	safety checks, delivering winter warmth packs, giving energy efficiency advice and hand
	holding vulnerable householders through the scheme. Visiting targeted addresses can be
	very time consuming and requires multiple visits. Without adequate funding, time dedicated
	to this task would be significantly reduced.
	The DfC has written to Building Control management requesting attendance at a full day
3.7	workshop with Senior managers from each Council area at the end of May to discuss the
	budget position and unit costs.
	Financial & Resource Implications
3.8	
	The proposed £13,575 per quarter is insufficient funding to cover resources required to
	deliver this program on behalf of DfC. This could impact on staffing levels in the near future.
