1.0	Purpose of Report or Summary of main Issues	
1.1	An advanced issue was raised by Councillor Milne at the People and Communities Committee	
	meeting on 12th September 2017 to consider directing additional resources towards an	
	appropriate tree planting programme throughout the city with the object of maintaining local	
	biodiversity and urban habitat. Councillor Milne also proposed that the Council assess the	
	feasibility of developing a programme of activities to tie in with National Tree Week which runs	
	annually from the end of November through to early December.

3.0	Main report
3.1	Belfast City Council is responsible for the management of 12,500 street trees on behalf of the
	Department for Infrastructure – Road Service and also manages over 60,000 plus Park trees
	throughout the city.
3.2	As part of the Council's Park tree management programme; health and condition tree inspections are undertaken on a cyclical basis of all our semi-mature, mature and over mature Park trees and from the survey findings, recommendations for remedial tree surgery works are highlighted which include the removal of dead, diseased and dying trees. As part of the tree surveys our Woodland officers also identify locations within our Parks for replacement/new tree planting however this recommended tree planting hasn't happened in recent years due mainly to a lack of dedicated resources; that said resources have now been allocated from within existing budgets to the value of £20,000 per annum and this will allow the Council to undertake all outstanding replacement tree planting as well as planting new additional trees.
3.3	Looking back over the last three decades the Council has been credited in planting many thousands of new trees in our Parks and Open Spaces and has worked closely with schools, community groups and other interested parties which has served to promote the benefits of trees and increased our urban forest footprint. This year's National Tree Week theme is 'Tree Values' and it will run between 25 <sup>th</sup> November and 3 <sup>rd</sup> December 2017 (see appendix No1 – NTW poster). Our Parks outreach officers will be organising various tree planting and educational activities to promote the value of trees as part of NTW at the following locations: • Sir Thomas and Lady Dixon Park • Grovelands • Half Moon Lake • Cherryvale • Cregagh Green • Loopriver • Glenbank • Cavehill • Water Works
3.4	The replacement and new additional tree planting will further add to and provide much needed habitats for wildlife and biodiversity.
