1.0	Purpose of Report or Summary of main Issues	
1.1	Members will be aware requests for the use of the City Hall grounds are normally dealt	
	under the authority delegated by the Committee to the Director of Property & Projects, using	
	criteria agreed for this purpose. Occasionally however, it is necessary to place such requests	
	directly before the Committee, and the request set out below falls into this category.	
1.2	A request has recently been received from the organiser of the Belfast Photo Festival (BPF)	
	to have a photographic exhibition in the grounds of the City Hall between the 1st and the 24 th	
	June 2018. The BPF is the visual arts festival of Northern Ireland and one of the leading	
	photography festivals in the UK. Launched in 2011 the festival attracts 85,000 visitors across	
	24 city centre venues and is one of the city's major art events.

ach year the city wide festival includes the grounds of Belfast City Hall as a primary location r both photographic exhibitions and other events. Previous exhibits have included the eLorean Print Project in 2015 which proved to be very successful and brought a real pectacle to the City Hall lawns. In 2017 the exhibition looked at sexuality and the 'ways in hich the camera is used to construct and deconstruct gender binaries'. The theme of the Photo Festival for 2018 is around Music & Photography and 'the camera's le in capturing individuality within the music industry and the industry's influence on the rmation of identity'.
le in capturing individuality within the music industry and the industry's influence on the
ver three years' photographer James Mollison photographed fans outside different oncerts. He was fascinated by the 'different tribes' that attend them, and how people nulate celebrity to form their identity. As he photographed, he began to see how the oncerts became events for people to come together with surrogate 'families' and provide a nance to relive their youth or try to be part of a scene that happened before they were born.
